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Dear Tonasket Families,

It is hard to believe that it is nearly November already! Parent-teacher conferences are just around the corner on November 7th and 8th, and teachers are looking forward to the opportunity to meet with parents and work collaboratively to maximize your child's success in school. Partnering with your child's teacher can help your child have a more positive outlook on school, and provide the teacher with valuable insight to personalize instruction for your child. If you haven't yet scheduled your parent-teacher conference, please call the school office to arrange a time you can meet with your child's teacher.

I have received questions about our **homework policy** and wanted to address it in this month's newsletter. Our staff has spent a great deal of time reviewing research on homework. What we have learned is that traditional homework has very little impact on academic achievement in the primary grades. The exception to this is in the area of reading. In fact, the amount of time students spend reading is one of the best predictors of reading achievement. In light of this information, our homework policy is as follows:

- Homework activities should include reading, playing board or card games with family members, and talking with family members about topics your student is learning in school.
- Time spent on homework each night should be no more than 10 minutes per grade level. For example, 20 minutes for 2nd grade, 30 minutes for 3rd grade, etc.

It is our hope that this also frees up time for your child to be able to participate in other important activities such as playing outside, participating in team sports or learning to play a musical instrument.

If you feel that your child is struggling with a concept, I encourage you to talk with their teacher for additional ideas on how to support them at home.

This month, our *Second Step* schoolwide theme is Skills for Learning: listening, focusing attention, using self-talk to stay on-task, and being assertive when asking for help with a learning task. In our morning announcements and school assemblies, we'll be reminding students of these skills, which help students be successful learners.

Our Veterans Assembly is scheduled for Wednesday, November 6th at 9:00 AM. Students and staff alike enjoy this opportunity to honor veterans. Parents are welcome to attend.

Finally, don't forget First Friday Coffee is just around the corner on November 1st at 8:45 AM. I always enjoy this time to talk with parents, answer questions they may have, and gather feedback on how we are doing at meeting the needs of our students and their families. First Friday Coffee just happens to coincide with our schoolwide pajama day this year. Parents, feel free to join me in your PJs as well!

When to Keep your Child home from school

As we head into cold/flu season please remember the following guidelines. Please make sure the office has the correct phone/emergency contact information in the event your child needs to be picked up during the school day!

Fever-please keep your student home if they have a temperature above 100.4 degrees. Keep your student home until they have been fever free for 24 hours **WITHOUT** the use of fever controlling medication such as Tylenol or Ibuprofen

Vomiting/Diarrhea-Student should be kept home if they have vomited or had watery stools within the past 24 hours.

Persistent/productive cough-(one that you would not want your well child to be around).

Strep Throat/Pink Eye/Other contagious infections that require antibiotics -Students may return 24 hours after treatment is started

Rash or skin infection - take your student to health care provider for diagnosis and treatment.

Lice- Keep your child home until hair has been treated and live bugs removed. Nits need to be combed daily until all nits are gone.

For the health and safety of our students and employees, your child will be sent home if any of the above symptoms/conditions/illnesses are found or suspected during the school day.

Hand washing is the best way to prevent the spread of illness. Soap and water for at least 20 seconds is still the best way to stay healthy!

Children with asthma or other life-threatening conditions are at high risk for severe symptoms from influenza and other viruses. Please discuss and update your child's asthma action plan with his/her doctor. Please make sure your child is using his/her controller medication as prescribed and also has access to his/her emergency medications, such as inhalers, etc.

Parents of student in younger grades-Bathroom accidents are common in ES. It is a good idea to keep an extra set of clothes in your student's backpack, especially if you are noticing they are coming home in different clothes frequently. We have limited sizes and space to keep extra clothes. Sometimes we do need parents to bring clothes in if your student has had a bathroom accident.



Winter is almost here! Our 6th annual *Fall Food Drive* is just around the corner! November 18th-22nd will be our Elementary Food Drive. All kids are encouraged to donate food to help take care of our community. So anyway.....

I hope everyone is well and enjoying the colder days. I mean, there coming one way or another so why not take it with a smile.

Positive behavior support; let's keep going. When last we visited I shared about two very powerful teaching methods; shaping and chaining. Recall that these are both methods for teaching while ensuring success. Sometimes we call this errorless teaching because it's about impossible to make a mistake or error.

I ended last month with a thought that I would like to elaborate on today. I cannot over emphasize how vastly important it is to know why (adult, student, child, whatever) someone did something or failed to do something. Almost as important, what happens if we're wrong.

Remember; hill, will and skill. Let me explain. Mrs. Huckaby (I wonder if she ever gets tired of me using her in the newsletter...?) asks me to make 4 loaves of rye bread and a batch of split pea soup. Knowing that I love to cook, she was surprised to come home and find it not done. What should she do? It really, really depends.

Let's start with **skill**. I tried to make the bread but putting the yeast into boiling water didn't seem to work (which it never will). I tried twice. So will punishment work in this situation....no. Regardless of what the consequence / punishment is, it won't work. I simply don't know how to do the behavior. I need teaching.

Hill; I know how to bake bread but when I was also trying to make soup at the same time, disaster ensued. In other words, I can perform the tasks separately but doing them together was just too much. Real important, if I look at the task and think it's too hard and I can't do it', I am typically correct. Perception of a task is 90% of it. So, will punishment work here? Probably not. I already feel pretty bad because I either failed, gave up or didn't try. Sure I may hide it under a bunch of "not fair" or "I don't care" but really, how great does not getting something done make you feel. The fix; presentation and practice. A little coaching aimed at reaffirming my culinary skills. Plus, maybe presenting the job a bit differently next time. Practice is always a good idea.

But what about **will?** I can do the behavior, fluently and competently, but just really don't want to. Can this be punished away...perhaps. Before we go down this road, I ask you to reflect on just how important this battle is to fight. If I am teaching my daughters (now long grown) to look, listen and go when crossing the street, this is one I am not walking away from. I can honestly say that I couldn't care less if they are not interested in or care about cross walk signals; they are going to do the behavior correctly! It really is a matter of health and safety.

But should I apply this same logic or perspective to a different behavior like picking up her socks?

And...let's consider being wrong. Mrs. Huckaby **ASSUMES** I know how to do the behavior, it's not too hard and I am just refusing. So I get grounded from my motorcycles for 100 months. If what I need is instruction or reframing or practice, punishment not only will not fix it but now we have lots of hard feelings to go with the behavior I can't do. Swell!

So let's turn the tables; we reteach the desired behavior. Even twice. Have I really done any damage? Plus, after reteaching and watching, there's no assumption involved. You know I can do the behavior. Food for thought.

Book Fair Volunteers



The Importance of Regular Attendance

One topic that we've focused on over the past month has been attendance. There is a growing body of research highlighting the importance of students attending school regularly. Did you know:

- Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.
- Missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.
- Excessive absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up

Put simply, regular attendance at school is essential to your child's success in learning.

This past week, students were awarded certificates for perfect attendance during the month of

September. Students will have an opportunity to earn attendance awards each month throughout the school year.


